Singapore Jurisprudence: Public Prosecutor v. Kung Chao (2022)

Singapore: Public Prosecutor v. Kung Chao (2022)

In the case of *Public Prosecutor v. Kung Chao* (2022), the Singapore judiciary addressed the handling and seizure of computing devices, specifically establishing critical rules for volatile data preservation.

Mandatory Live-State Documentation: The court ruled that live-state documentation is mandatory when seizing laptop evidence. Specifically, examiners and first responders must document a device's active state—including open applications, active network connections, and logged-in users—prior to powering down or disconnecting the device.

Strategic Impact for Forensic Practitioners

Failing to capture volatile evidence and omitting live-state documentation during a laptop seizure can compromise the reliability and admissibility of the digital evidence under Section 10 of the Evidence Act. Practitioners must ensure that first responder protocols incorporate standardized live-state capture checklists.

Application for Forensic Workflows

To align with the ruling in *Public Prosecutor v. Kung Chao* (2022), forensic teams operating in Singapore must:

- **Implement Live Triage Protocols:** Capture volatile memory and screen states before executing any physical shutdown or transport of portable computers.
- **Maintain Comprehensive Logs:** Record all active processes, network sockets, and user sessions in the initial evidence collection report.

- **Adhere to Statutory Standards:** Combine live-state records with robust chain-of-custody documentation to satisfy Singapore court requirements for electronic records.
